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



Returning Home: the Struggle is Real

The first days after returning home to your "normal" life can feel a little like vertigo. You may call your cultural routines and lifestyles into question after the paradigm shift of your STMT experience and you may feel confused or frustrated with your life and the people around you. But God has a plan for you, and wants to help you grow closer to Him as you seek Him through these times of mixed-emotions.







DAY ONE:

Watch Video: <u>Jennifer Edwards, Inca Link Missionary in Costa Rica:</u>

One truth we often struggle with is the idea that God surely doesn't want to use us, as individuals. Due to our past, due to our insufficiency, our doubt, our weakness, our present circumstances..., but this is not true! God has a perfect plan for our lives when we commit our lives to Him.


Describe a time or circumstance when you felt like God could not use you or did not see you. How did you feel in that moment?

Live Fully No Matter Your Circumstances

No sooner had the Israelites been carried off into exile in Babylon than God prompted Jeremiah to send them a letter to encourage and instruct them! This is what we read in the 29th chapter of Jeremiah: a letter sent to people held captive, not living where or how they wanted.

Can you relate to any part of that? In what way?

Surprisingly, God didn't first chastise them, and he also didn't immediately rescue them. Instead, he encouraged them to put down roots and live fully despite their circumstances! When we are going through tough times, it is tempting to hang our heads and throw in the towel. But God says, "Don't give up! Live, thrive! Build, plant, multiply!"





Pray Peace and Welfare for Those Who Are Troubling You

This next step is perhaps more difficult than we want to admit. Raise your hand if you have trouble praying for the good of all people around you, including those who are causing you problems. Hand raised here! Goodness, this hits between the eyes! Look at the reasons God calls us to do that:

7 But seek the welfare of the city where I have sent you into exile, and pray to the Lord on its behalf, for in its welfare you will find your welfare. (Jeremiah 29:7 ESV)

The NIV translates "welfare" here as "peace and prosperity." Does it sound unspiritual to say this? When the people around us live in peace and prosperity, so will we, and wouldn't we want that?

Who has been the most difficult person around you to pray for? Why? What would change if you prayed for their welfare?

Will you commit with me today to pray for the hardest people in your life to pray for?

Trust God's Long-Term Plan

Finally, God calls us to trust his plan for the long-term despite what things look like today. For the people of Israel, the wait for freedom would last 70 long years. They would see kings rise and fall; they would live through persecution and trial.

Remember Daniel in the Lion's Den and the account of The Fiery Furnace? Those events and countless other trials challenged the Israelites during their time in Babylon.

Yet God encouraged them to hold onto him, to trust in him, and when the time was right, their trial would end.


10 "For thus says the LORD: When seventy years are completed for Babylon, I will visit you, and I will fulfill to you my promise and bring you back to this place. 11 For I know the plans I have for you, declares the LORD, plans for welfare and not for evil, to give you a future and a hope. (Jeremiah 29:10-11 ESV)

God had a future and a hope planned for the Israelites, and he does for us, too!

In what ways has it been difficult for you to "wait on the Lord" and his timing?

How would your life change if you committed to both living fully in your present circumstance and to trusting God's plan and timing for your future?





DAY TWO

Watch Video: <u>Daniel Ascencio, Inca Link Missionary in Honduras</u>

God wants to meet us where we are, in any situation or struggle and teach us that his grace is sufficient. If we love and trust him, he can take the circumstances of our lives and use them for his glory, our growth and ultimately as a blessing.

Life is difficult and heart-wrenching at times; illness, death, financial burdens, depression and disappointment are part of our human condition, but in the midst of these God is worthy of our praise. He wants to find us faithful in trusting him in every situation.

Daniel recounts a period of time of personal struggle and heartache, and how he was reminded of God's sufficiency and love in the midst of sorrow and loneliness and ultimately of God's faithful blessing and provision. A reminder to us all, that God's grace is sufficient and his power is made perfect in our weakness (2 Corinthians 12:9).



It is often said that hindsight is 20/20, meaning that it is easier to see the events of your life clearly, when looking back. Think about a difficult time in your life when you were struggling with something, but then later realized a "blessing" ultimately resulted. How did it make you feel while you were experiencing this event?

How were you ultimately "blessed" by this experience?

Sometimes this verse is taken out of context, so I encourage you to read all of Romans Chapter 8.

Why is struggle part of our lives?

Why should we glorify God in the midst of our struggles?

Have you ever been so distraught that you couldn't pray?

How does it make you feel to know the Holy Spirit prays for us in these moments? (Rom. 8:26)

How can you know that God has called you for His purposes?

How does it feel to know you are called by God?





DAY THREE

Watch Video: Will Eason, Director of Bonsai After-School Program, Ecuador

We have a tendency towards exercises in futility in trying to control things and then to worry. We not only worry about things we can't change, but also the little things that don't matter. God knows what we need and takes care of our needs because he cares about us. We need to trust in the provision of our Father, but not only that, we need to keep our primary focus on God and seeking His kingdom and righteousness first.

God's kingdom is wherever his authority is established and recognized. Seeking God's kingdom first is to submit your life to that authority, to His kingship, to love, trust and obey Him. When you do that, you become a willing vessel through which God expands His kingdom in the world, into the hearts of people. This is the heart of missions!

What about seeking His righteousness? The first part of seeking His righteousness is recognizing your own righteousness is not enough, You are not capable of keeping God's law on your own. Jesus' mission on earth was to live a perfectly righteous life and then sacrifice that life on the cross. When you believe in Jesus, His righteousness becomes your righteousness.

We are to seek these things first. Why? In seeking His kingdom and His righteousness first, he then gives His fullness and purpose to everything else in your life. As we seek His kingdom and righteousness first, we won't have to worry about anything else because he is going to take care of us.

DAY FOUR


Watch Video: <u>Tolu Solola, Associate Pastor, First Alliance Church</u>, Calgary, Alberta, CA.

Paul wrote this message to the Ephesians following one of his many short-term mission trips, but he didn't just write it for them, but for us!

Paul points out that while he may be in prison, his present circumstance was no excuse to give up on his calling to share the Gospel. He gives us four powerful words of advice, each a reminder of what Jesus said to his own disciples, teaching them and us not to be discouraged by our present circumstances, but to live fully devoted to Jesus.

Paul reminds us to "live out our calling" as Jesus did in John 12:49-50. To "be gentle and humble", as Jesus told us in Matt. 11:29. To "be patient and loving" as Jesus' words in John 13:34-35. And to "make every effort to keep unity", as Jesus urged in John 17:11. Paul is reminding us to not just hear the words, but to live the life that Christ has called us to! He is inviting us into Christ's likeness!

Sometimes missions can feel discouraging and can even test our faith. It may feel impossible to reach the lost or heal the broken. BUT Jesus is the resurrection and the life, and salvation belongs to Him. It is through His strength and through the resurrection power that we can live out His calling in our lives. This good news brings us the hope we need to live for Him, even if we feel imprisoned by discouragement.

DAY FIVE:

Watch video: Elisa Shannon Brown, International Worker & Founder of Inca Link

Loving other people isn't an option, it is a commandment. Jesus commands us to love others as he has loved us. But, is loving other people easy? Loving others is not a job description, but it is the foundation of missional living.

Why does Jesus call it a new commandment? The call is no longer to simply love others the way you love yourself, but to love them more than we love ourselves. Loving them the way Jesus did. His love was missional love. He commands us to be willing to lay down our lives, to die to self in our love.

We must be little Christ's in our community, living with the people, close enough to know them and their needs, close enough to serve them. We need to recognize the resources God has given us, turning them over to God to multiply. Love is a resource! We can only love to the extent that we have received Christ's love for us. God will take our small sacrifice of love and multiply it to others. Love is the key ingredient to missional living and without it mission can not take place. Everything else done without love is an empty act (1 Cor. 13). Self-giving love is missional love.

What has God revealed to you about loving others? Submit these things to the Lord, and ask Him to help you love others through his love and strength.




Moving Inside Out

May we be motivated toward movement in sharing the life for all that Christ offers through his death and resurrection. Apart from Christ there can be no life. Because of Christ, life can be brought to others.



What does it mean to be "compelled" to do something?
What specifically compels you to share Jesus with others?
What holds you back from sharing Jesus with others?
Who are the people who are unworthy of Christ's death and redemption? (Romans 3:10, 23)
According to 2 Corin. 5:14-15, who are the people that Jesus didn't die for?
With this is mind, are there people you are hesitant to reach out to that need to know that Jesus died for them and longs to give them life? If so, who are they and what makes you reluctant?

Take some time in prayer asking the Holy Spirit to reveal to you any hesitation you have about sharing Jesus with certain people groups. Confess this as he reveals it in your heart and seek his empowering to love those who are lost.





DAY SEVEN

Watch video: Katie Beth Craig. University of Kentucky

Living in a missional way and serving people through the love of Christ takes a humble laying aside of our own wants and needs to place other's needs ahead of our own. It can be so easy to seek our own comfort and desires, without even realizing it! Grasping for self needs/wants first even in the smallest of things competes with our desire and ability to serve. It requires that we ask the Lord to reveal our hearts and bring an awareness of the needs of others.

The Lord calls us to missional living in the context of where he places you wherever he places you! We often get the idea that serving God somewhere else is more important than the time and place where he has you at present. Serving the Lord whole-heartedly even in the small/simple ways, where you are right now is key!

Stephen, in the book of Acts, was called by the disciples to meet the needs of the people in the town where he was, so that others could serve by traveling to share the Gospel.

Laying down our own needs and desires, including the need for recognition and respect in order to focus on meeting the needs of others is not possible in our own strength, but God gives us the gift of the Holy Spirit to empower us to lay aside our self-focus and place others first.

DAY EIGHT

Watch video: Paul Overmoyer, Coordinator Inca Link Colombia

Have you ever wondered why you can quickly connect to some strangers who are also followers of Jesus? You knew that there was something you shared that drew you together. Christians have a particular body odor that nobody else has; the aroma of Christ! This aroma either attracts repentant to Jesus as they smell the sweet scent of forgiveness and life or causes unrepentant sinners to reject him, as they find the reminder of their death in sin repulsive. This aroma, although offensive to those lost in their sin, is a reminder of God's love and that they need his forgiveness and life.

There are three truths that we can find in 2 Corinthians 2-3. The first is that God always leads us to triumph in Christ. He has already guaranteed our success in spreading the aroma of Christ to the world around us! The second is that God manifests the sweet aroma of knowing Jesus through us. God uses you to let other people know how great our savior is. He uses you to spread Jesus everywhere you go! The third asks, "Who is adequate to do these things"? Who is adequate to share the Gospel, to let people know that life is in Jesus? We are! The secret to this is that our adequacy comes from God. Not in our own strength, but in his! He has given us everything we need to be the sweet smell of Jesus to those around us, and a reminder to those who do not know him yet.

Describe a time when you felt an instant connection to another follower of Christ.
What was it that helped you feel connected?
How does it make you feel that some people will be attracted to the "aroma" of Jesus they sense in you?
How does it make you feel that some people will be repulsed by the Jesus they sense in you? Does this ever make you want to disguise the "aroma" of Jesus in you? Why or why not?
Knowing you are guaranteed to succeed at being the aroma of Christ, both sweet and repulsive, and this is God's means of drawing people to life in Christ, what does that mean for you in living a missional life each and every day?
In what ways do you feel adequate to share the Gospel? In what ways do you feel inadequate?
Submit your sense of inadequacies to the Lord, allowing his strength to prepare you to share the aroma of Christ.

From Home Into The World

Missional living begins at home, with your family and all who enter your threshold, but it doesn't stop there! There is a whole world of people needing to hear and understand the Gospel. God has placed you in your family to share His love and truth, but He will also strategically place you before the lost in other areas, if you allow Him to use you for His glory.

DAY NINE

In the beginning, God...these first four words from the Bible reveal the truth, that there is no life outside of God, he is the source of Life and all life depends on him. While on your mission trip, it may have been easy to find yourself immersed in daily dependence on God, but now that you are back home, you may find it more difficult to maintain your daily focus and dependence on God. So how do you maintain your dependence on God? By loving him with all that you are, beginning with your heart.

The heart determines what really matters to you. Love of God is a personal interactive relationship with God where he is more valuable than anything else in your life. And if God is the most valuable thing in your heart, it will also be reflected in your strength, in your thoughts and every other part of who you are. How do you keep your focus on him? By allowing God's truth to shape everything you do in your life, your friendships, your work, your school, the kind of son or daughter, father or mother you are. How do you allow God's truth to flow through your mind so that it shapes every aspect of who you are? You meditate on God's truth, think about it, internalize it and live through it, as the overflow of your heart. This produces a truthful, life of God filled-actions. Your heart, what you value, what you are committed to determines the course of your life, and you can shape your heart with God's truth.

Why does God deserve to be on the top of your list? Is anything keeping him from the top?
What are some ways that you can fill your heart with God's truth?
How will you allow God's truth to shape and saturate all of your life?
How is God's truth part of your relationships?
How does God's truth shape your schooling or work?
How does God's truth impact how you live a missional lifestyle?

Focus your prayer today on God's worthiness and his truth, asking the Holy Spirit to fill you with an awestruck awareness of God's glory and holiness.

DAY TEN

Watch Video: <u>Juan Carlos Cevallos, Regional Director</u> with Nexus International Missional Living

The story of Phillip and the Ethiopian teaches us four points about living a missional lifestyle.

The first comes from verse 26, when the angel tells Phillip where to go. This shows us that God is reaching out and speaking to us, calling us and he wants us to obey when he calls.

The second is found when the angel tells Phillip to go to a particular place. God wants us where we are right now. Only God knows his plans for you, and he has placed you exactly where you are for those purposes. You don't have to wait to go somewhere else, missional living happens wherever you are. Where you are is where God wants you to be.

The third principle is in verse 29, The Spirit told Phillip what to do. The Holy Spirit is talking to us, he is active and we need to listen. Take time to slow down, quiet down and listen to what God is saying to you. Listen.

Finally, the Ethiopian is reading from Isaiah, Phillip steps in and explains the Gospel. It is important that you continue diving into scripture, dwelling in God's word so you are prepared to share the good news. Be preparing yourself daily to share Jesus.

Spend some time praying about the four points, submitting them to the Lord and asking him to reveal any weak areas, and any actions he is calling you to take.



Social Justice and Hospitality

Loving "the least of these" was a recurring theme of Jesus' ministry and of the apostles which followed after him. Yet somehow in many ways, the church has forgotten Christ's call to serve the poor, broken, outcast and prisoners. May we live in such a way to bring up the station of the lowly through love, support, hospitality, advocacy and sacrifice.





"He said also to the man who had invited him, "When you give a dinner or a banquet, do not invite your friends or your brothers or your relatives or rich neighbors lest they also invite you in return and you be repaid. But when you give a feast, invite the poor, the crippled, the lame, the blind, and you will be blessed, because they cannot repay you. For you will be repaid at the resurrection of the just."

Luke 14:12-14



DAY ELEVEN

Watch video: Dan Kasnick, Co-Founder and Director of Camp D&D Perú

Our society is very transactional in mentality...putting the emphasis on the reciprocal; "I'll scratch your back if you scratch mine." This passage is quite counter-cultural in that aspect. It is easy to marginalize the importance of going beyond the transactional and truly learning how to "host" others without being motivated by what you may get out of the experience. Both the action and the intention are so very important.

On the mission field it can seem easy to live to serve without being served, because it is built into your time and purpose on the trip. But when you return home to your routines, the importance of living to give and serve can be easily forgotten in the day by day. It requires us to be intentional and seek out what God has intended for us right where we are. It is easy to mislabel the "mission field" as a specific place, but the mission field is wherever you are right now.





How do you feel when you serve others? What are the benefits you gain from these experiences?
It is a blessing when God provides these "benefits and blessings" when we serve others, but why is it so important not to allow ourselves to become motivated by the blessing we may receive?
Who are the people that are marginalized in your community? Your work place? Your school? Your church?
Why do you think it is so important to be intentional in seeking to serve others without reciprocity in your community? What has been your experience?
In what ways can you intentionally set out to serve the marginalized you have

identified above?



"When the Son of Man comes in his glory, and all the angels with him, then he will sit on his glorious throne. Before him will be gathered all the nations, and he will separate people one from another as a shepherd separates the sheep from the goats. For I was hungry and you gave me food, I was thirsty and you gave me drink, I was a stranger and you welcomed me, I was naked and you clothed me, I was sick and you visited me, I was in prison and you came to me.' Then the righteous will answer him, saying, 'Lord, when did we see you hungry and feed you, or thirsty and give you drink? And when did we see you a stranger and welcome you, or naked and clothe you? And when did we see you sick or in prison and visit you?' And the King will answer them, Truly, I say to you, as you did it to one of the least of these my brothers, you did it to me.' Matthew 25:31-40 ESV

DAY TWELVE

There is a difference between those who do what Jesus asks them to do and those who do not. What does Jesus ask us to do? Love others, especially those neglected by society.

The question at hand, then is, "How can I serve the least of these?" Love is the answer! Little things done in love have Kingdom impact! You don't have to do big things, but small things done in love, empowered by prayer demonstrate the Gospel to a hurting world. God wants faithfulness in the small things. Mother Teresa said, "We are called to be faithful, not successful." God is in control of the outcome. He continues to do miracles as we faithfully obey him, even in the small things. Jesus asks us to serve those in prison, the hungry, the thirsty, those who are in need. Serve and give of the little you have and God will be glorified. Chapter 2 of the Book of James reminds us that faith without works is dead, may your faith grow as you serve others in love.

Rich was born and raised in Ecuador to missionary parents. He and Elisa have served 28 years as International Workers. They founded Inca Link to reach the 300 million youth in Latin America. This is a pretty amazing passage when you think about the implications of sharing hospitality with strangers. Looking back at Genesis 18, we find Abraham entertaining angels unaware, and how God used that experience to bless his family and ultimately, the whole world! God reminds us in this story of how we should treat everyone we meet, because we never know the implications nor the impact of our hospitality.

Hospitality does not depend on language or cultural barriers, nor should it be impeded by prejudice, grudges or differences. Hospitality should be delivered with the highest attention to being the hands and feet of Jesus as we love on people in amazing, but simple ways. American (US) culture is often not the most hospitable, especially to strangers, but it is an area we, as Christ's followers, are called to, and it is particularly important to missional living.

Ask God for opportunities to share hospitality in such a way that it brings strangers into His kingdom.

Mark is blessed to be the mission pastor at a church that's partnering & sending all over the globe. He gets to connect & build collaborating partnerships with churches on five continents and back up their sent ones serving in many cross-cultural locations. Amazing enough, He loves traveling to new places and meeting new people!



We have a tendency to try to do things in our own strength and ability, quickly forgetting that God is our strength! When returning from a mission trip, we try to regain control over our day to day, forgetting that much like a small child, we need our father to take care of our every need. We as believers are called to abide in our father, to sit and be with him, remaining and resting in the presence and abilities of our God.

Our mission is the same at home as it was internationally, to make disciples. But we can only accomplish this by abiding in God and allowing him to use us as we live for him in our everyday lives. In this God will do immeasurably more than we can ever hope or imagine (Eph. 3:20). We tend to trust in our abilities to do good things for God, but apart from God, we truly can do nothing. Everything we do as a follower of God must come from our daily walk with God.



"As you serve God, the more he reshapes (prunes) you into his image." How has God been shaping you lately?

Crossing the Finish Line

DAY SEVENTEEN

Rest. Rest

In Matthew 11:28-30, we find two invitations to rest. The invitation of verse 28 is the one Jesus uses to save people from the burden of sin. The invitation of verses 29 and 30 is the one Jesus uses to give Christians rest from the burdens of the Christian life.

The invitation of verse 28 is an invitation to stop fighting sin not by giving into sin, but by laying sin down at Jesus' feet and letting him carry its load. Jesus said; "Come to me, all you who are weary and burdened, and I will give you rest." (Mt. 11:28 NIV) Therefore, the first rest (v. 28) is the rest that comes through salvation. It is a PASSIVE REST. We receive this rest by laying down our sins at Jesus' feet.

The second invitation to rest, from verses 29 and 30, is not a passive rest. It is an ACTIVE REST. It is a rest that WE MUST FIND by following Jesus and learning from him. It is a rest offered to Christians who, at times, get so busy with life or ministry that we stop following Jesus and instead work on our own plans and in our own power. As a consequence, life becomes hard and heavy. During these times, Jesus says to us, "Take my yoke upon you and learn from me, for I am gentle and humble in heart, and you will find rest for your souls. For my yoke is easy and my burden is light." (Mt. 11:29-30 NIV).

Ignacio was born in Mexico and lived in Idaho and in Colorado most of his life. He is the Director of Ninawachi Mission Institute and loves to teach and play golf. Ignacio is an Inca Link Missionary to Ecuador.



Chances are that you have heard this passage many times before, yet as Jesus is responding to a question from an expert in the law...we may miss this key word "and" and we replace it with, "yeah but" and make excuses for why we can't love our neighbor. Jesus is very clear when he calls us to love God with all that we have. The natural fruit for our love of the Lord will be seen in the way we love our neighbors.

Neighbors are not limited to the people we know well and share commonalities with in close proximity, but also includes the people who are different than us. It can be scary to step out in obedience to interact with people who are different than you, who have a different culture, dress differently or speak a different language or are in a different living situation. Learning how to love your neighbors as fruit of your love of the Lord is an incredible gift.

When you Love the Lord your God AND love your neighbor as yourself, your "yeah, but" will become "But God" as he works through you to demonstrate his love to the world.

It can be very challenging to find creative ways to connect with your neighbors. How do you make those connections? Do you know your neighbors? Do they know you? Do they know you are a follower of Jesus? Are you a guide to them?

Perhaps the first step is to find opportunities to reach out to the people you don't know. Then, when you do get to know them, seek opportunities to be a guide to them by reflecting Christ through missional living.

The Importance of Being Really Present with People

Jesus realized that to truly minister to people, you need to spend time with them. John 1:14 emphasizes that the Word became flesh and dwelt among us! As Christ's chosen ambassadors, we are his representatives dwelling among lost and hurting people, and are called to His ministry of hope. Eighty percent of ministry is simply showing up! It's not that what we say and do isn't important, but we can't say or do anything if we don't show up!

One of the biggest hinderances we have in our society today, is that we have become experts at ignoring the people around us by being distracted, especially by our phones (phubbing). If your "face is buried in your phone", you can't connect to the people around you and you can miss the opportunities to be a vessel of the ministry of God's love. Who is God calling you to be present with today? Who do you need to be aware of, to share God's love with and minister to?

The good news is, God will be present with you today, through Jesus, and he calls us to be present with the people he has placed in our path.





After God called Him and his family to full-time missions to Latin America, he spent a year transitioning Crossroads Church into new leadership. Jake and his family have now joined the Inca Link team to reach the 300 million youth of Latin America.

The beautiful words in verse three provide reminders about living missional lives. Oil seeps into everything, and when you pour oil on your body it covers everything, reminding us that the joy God provides seeps into every area of your life. The garment of praise, reminds us of a blanket that covers you in praise in the trials and tribulations and we can trust Jesus. The oaks are big, tall, and strong, with deep roots. This reminds us that we are rooted in Jesus' righteousness and love.

Pastor Paul Smith states "Jesus linked everyday action with the mission of God in the world. I can value mission over comfort and fear". Jesus was speaking life to the lost every single day. Missional living is in the everyday moments, speaking with someone in line at the coffee shop instead of looking at your phone, making conversation with the person next to you, obeying the nudges of the Holy Spirit. Asking God; Where are you leading me? Where are you pushing me to me to better, to be more like you? Asking God to cover your day, his spirit and his presence first in your life.

Laying down your life

Christ asks each believer to lay down their lives for others, as he laid down his life for us. The heart of God is for us to love...to love God and our neighbor. Who is our neighbor? Anyone who is in need. And the needs are all around us! The Holy Spirit challenges us to do something with our lives, no matter where we live.

John shows us that loving others requires sacrifice, and loving through sacrifice is what living a missional lifestyle is all about. If we ask the Holy Spirit, he will reveal the needs all around us and equip us to be used by God to meet these needs.

One important step is to take inventory of your life, what you have and what you can give and offer it to the Lord, for his use. Casting off our sin and "everything that hinders us", and fixing our eyes on Jesus (Hebrews 12:1) frees us to serve and brings joy to Jesus and to us. Are there things that hinder you from serving the Lord?

Every church has hurting people, every town has people in need, ask the Holy Spirit to reveal the things that hinder you from serving and the ways he wants to use you to meet the needs of those around you, for His glory.

Mark is a retired Inca Link Missionary, who founded Ninawachi Mission Institute, located in the Amazon Basin of Ecuador. Ninawachi trains tribal people to become missionaries through Apostolic mission work.

Relationship and Responsibility

This passage indicates a cause-effect scenario... when the Holy Spirit is a part of your life he will empower you to be Christ's witness. The relationship you have with God, through Jesus, and His Holy Spirit dwelling within you changes you in such a way that you can't help but share it with other people. This relationship, nurtured through prayer, worship, and time in the word empowers you, through the Holy Spirit, to take on the responsibility to share Jesus with others.

Christ calls us to be his witnesses in Jerusalem, Judea, Samaria, and to the ends of the earth...all of them, not one or another. This is not a call to pick and choose your favorite destination, rather is is a four-fold responsibility of both the individual believer and of the united Church. Where do we get the ability to share Christ? From the empowering of the Holy Spirit!

Todd was born and raised in a Christian home, He collected a few educational diplomas and then the real adventure began. He married his wife Jill in 1990. They have four children ranging from 28 to 21 years old, plus a 4 year old. They have served in the C&MA for 31 years, 16 in local church context and 15 years as the director for strategic advancement in the Central district. In this role he's had the incredible privilege of partnering with a vast diversity of church planting efforts, (urban, suburban, rural, Appalachian, ethic, house churches, etc.). He's also had the thrill of studying church planting strategies and movements on four continents, partnering on the National Church Planting Team for the C&MA, starting the Mid-West Church Planting Center and working with multiple denominations in church planting training.



When the Holy Spirit shows up, you will be changed and you won't be able to shut up. Does that statement reflect your life and your lifestyle? Why or Why not?

Why is it so important to nurture your relationship with the Lord? What are some practical ways you can build your relationship?

In John 9:25, after a blind man had his sight restored by Jesus, he testified to the one thing he knew, saying: "though I was blind, now I see". His experience of how his life was changed by Jesus became his testimony. What is your testimony of how Jesus has changed your life?

Who are the people in your "inner circle" who do not yet know Jesus? How are you being Christ's witness to them? (Jerusalem)

How are you connecting with people who are "like" you in age, interests, culture or demographics who you may not have daily contact with? (Judea)

How can you be Christ's witness to the people who are different than you, but live geographically close?

It is easy to identify people who are different and geographically distant, but how can you discern ways to share Christ with those who are unreached in these places?

Read Colossians 4: 3-6. What advice does Paul give to the Colossians about reaching the world?

Pray that the Holy Spirit would fill and empower you, and enable you to discern who represents your Jerusalem, Judea, Samaria and the Ends of the Earth.

DAY TWENTY-EIGHT

There are Five words that stand out in this passage that give us direction for missional living. The first is "Go". Our obedience to him does not begin by sitting and waiting for him, but by getting up and going. This isn't limited to international travel, but also include faithfulness in your daily life, sharing the Gospel with family, in your school or workplace and in your community.

The second is "Disciple". A disciple is one who follows. Missional living is about helping people follow Jesus. We are called to make true followers, and in order to do so, we have to be a disciple to make a disciple.

The third is "Baptize". There is no magic that happens by immersing people in water, but it is an outward sign of obedience and a changed life. It is a public statement of our personal commitment to Jesus. We are to encourage others to announce their changed life before God and others.

The fourth is to "Teach" (train). It does not have to be a formal process, but a retelling of your story, of what you have experienced and how to live in the way that Jesus taught us. Teaching them to simply do what Jesus tells us to do.

Finally, "Jesus is with you". You are never alone. You don't have to do this on your own. He will tell you where to go, what to say, how to do it. Go, disciple others, baptize them, teach them as Jesus goes with you. Go and be his witnesses.

Russ has been a follower of Jesus since he was 7 years old, and has spent his life pursuing Him and His Kingdom. He comes alongside "strategically placed leaders" around the world and provides coaching, training, resources and community to them. He loves spending time with his wife, their family, and they all enjoy traveling and seeing the world!



Go

Have you ever forgotten the presence of Jesus in a situation, and tried to handle things on your own? What happened?

DAY TWENTY-NINE

In Matthew 24:3-14, the disciples asked Jesus how they would know when his Kingdom would come in the end of the age. Jesus tells them about a lot of dark things will be happening as the end of the age approaches. But... the gospel, the good news about Jesus will be shared before the end!

We should not be distracted by the happenings around us from living our call to share the good news with all the world. It is so easy to get caught up in the things that are going on in our world, the why? How come? But our call is clear...you are professing God's word through your living testimony to all the nations! At the end, evil doesn't overcome God's kingdom, Jesus has overcome!

No matter what our present environment is, we are to be about God's kingdom work! Our lives need to be a testimony of the greatness of our God! Our lives need to reflect our trust in a trustworthy God.

Whatever the circumstances, let God speak through our lives.

DAY THIRTY

This passage in Revelation is the fulfillment of a vision, it is what is to come, what we long for – and what an amazing glimpse of heaven that we get to see in this text! We learn that we will not even be able to fathom or count the number of people who have been saved through Jesus Christ ... although we do not know the number of people in the crowd we do learn that there are people from every tribe, every tongue, every people and language. And we see the diverse multitude crying out in worship to God!

Let that sink in for a minute - every tribe, tongue, nation, people group ... someone from each will be represented! What an amazing vision of the body of Christ!

Sometimes this vision fades in our lives and in ministry, the people group we are working with resists the gospel, the spiritual attack that comes is too overwhelming and we conclude that it just isn't worth it. We grow in our discouragement and sometimes we even grow to be immobile in our commission to take the Gospel to all nations. But Revelation 7:9-10 lets us know the outcome – and that outcome is ...there WILL be people from every tribe, tongue and nation who are worshiping at the throne!

So this is our crossroads - we have to make a choice, do we surrender our lives to live on mission and with the purpose that God created us for or do we sit on the sidelines refusing to believe that God could possibly use us?
